"Children of the Night" International Dracula Congress 2022

Keynote Speakers' Biographies

Dacre Stoker (Canada) is the great grand-nephew of Bram Stoker and the international best-selling coauthor of Dracula the Un-Dead (2009), the Stoker family endorsed sequel to Dracula. Dacre is also the co-editor (with Elizabeth Miller) of The Lost Journal of Bram Stoker: The Dublin Years (2012). Released in October of 2018, Dracul, a prequel to Dracula, co-authored with JD Barker, was the UK's # 1 Bestselling Hardcover Novel in Horror and Supernatural in 2018, and a top 5 finalist by the Horror Writers Association for the Bram Stoker Award[®] for Superior Achievement in a Novel. Film rights for Dracul have been optioned by Paramount Studios.

Dacre's recent work includes Dracula's Bedlam (2021) with Chris McAuley and John Peel and The Virgins Embrace (2021) with Chris McAuley, a graphic novel adaptation of Bram Stoker's short story The Squaw (1893). Additionally, short stories with Leverett Butts, Last Days, appeared in Weird Tales Magazine January 2021, The Tired Captain, featured in FX Sherlock Holmes Anthology, and Enter the Dragon in Classic Monsters Unleashed Anthology January 2022 and upcoming The Lost Warrior, in Dracula UnFanged Anthology coming out in the summer of 2022. Dacre has also collaborated with Scottish writer Mike Shepherd on Slains Castle's Secret History (Wild Wolf 2022) a novel of historical fiction written in narrative non fiction style.

A native of Montreal, Canada, Dacre taught Physical Education and Sciences for twenty-two years, in both Canada and the U.S. He has participated in the sport of Modern Pentathlon as an athlete and a coach at the international and Olympic levels for Canada for 12 years. He is also an avid player and coach of the unique game of Real Tennis. In September of 2022, an athlete he had been coaching for the past 8 years, Camden Riviere, won the World Championships of Court Tennis.

Dacre has consulted and appeared in recent film documentaries about vampires in literature and popular culture. The Real Vampire Files (2010 History Channel), The Tillinghast Nightmare, (2014 Historical Haunts), Secrets of the Dead (2015 PBS), Mysteries at the Museum, (2017 Travel Channel) Legend Hunter (2019 Travel Channel) He currently hosts tours to Dublin Ireland, Whitby England, and Cruden Bay Scotland, to visit places where Bram Stoker lived, was educated, worked, researched, and wrote Dracula. He also leads groups to Transylvania to explore both the life and times of the historic Vlad Dracula III and also the locations where Bram Stoker set his famous novel.

Enrique A Palafox (Mexico) is a Doctor in Modern Literature & a Creative Designer based in Mexico City. He has experience working as a designer in Entertainment and as Part-time Lecturer. He also has a Master's degree in Communications and he is currently working on the adaptation of Dracula by Bram Stoker into media content & Merchandising items.

Hans Corneel de Roos (The Netherlands/Germany/The Philippines) studied Political & Social Sciences at the University of Amsterdam and the Free University, Berlin; graduated cum laude in 1975. He made a career in Public Administration and in the financial field; his true passions, however, were (and are) Art, Art History and Photography. He got involved in Dracula Studies in 2010 while preparing a photo-illustrated Dracula edition. Since then, he has made a series of groundbreaking discoveries about the true locations of Castle Dracula, the Scholomance and Carfax, the lifetime identity of Count Dracula, the Icelandic and Swedish versions and the first US serialization of Dracula. De Roos is the translator/editor of Powers of Darkness (New York: Overlook, 2017), and contributed to Dracula–An International Perspective (ed. Marius Crișan, Palgrave, 2017). He was the Acting Editor of Letter from Castle Dracula, the bulletin of the Transylvanian Society of Dracula (2013-2016) and is the author of numerous articles about Stoker's novel. He received the Research Award from the Transylvanian

Society of Dracula and the Lord Ruthven Special Award 2018. He is the initiator of the Fourth World Dracula Congress in Dublin (2016) and the "Children of the Night" International Dracula Conference series. John Edgar Browning (USA) (Ph.D., SUNY-Buffalo), Professor of Liberal Arts at the Savannah College of Art and Design, has appeared as an expert guest on or consulted for such documentary programs as National Geographic's Taboo USA (2013), Discovery Channel's William Shatner's Weird or What? (2010), AMC's Eli Roth's History of Horror (2018), History Channel's The UnXplained (2020), Disney+'s The World According to Jeff Goldblum (2021), and Netflix, as well as numerous radio programs. He has contracted or published 20 academic and popular trade books and at least 100 articles, chapters, and reviews on subjects that cluster around Dracula, vampires, zombies, horror, and the Gothic, including: The Forgotten Writings of Bram Stoker (Palgrave, 2012) and the forthcoming Dracula—An Anthology: Critical Reviews and Reactions, 1897–1920 (Edinburgh University Press), as well as critical editions of Montague Summers's The Vampire: His Kith and Kin and The Vampire in Europe (Apocryphile Press, 2011, 2014); with Caroline Joan S. Picart, he co-edited as well Speaking of Monsters: A Teratological Anthology (Palgrave, 2012) and co-wrote Dracula in Visual Media (McFarland, 2010); with David R. Castillo, David Schmid, and David A. Reilly, he co-wrote Zombie Talk: Culture, History, Politics (Palgrave Pivot, 2016); and, with Darren Elliott-Smith, co-edited New Queer Horror Film and Television (Horror Studies) (University of Wales Press, 2020). He is also co-editor of the second Norton Critical Edition of Dracula (2021) with David J. Skal.

Laura Loguercio Cánepa (Brasil) is PhD in Multimedia (Unicamp, Brazil, 2008). She has published several works on Brazilian horror films, including "Erotic Brazilian Movies of Female Killers" (in *A Panorama of Brazilan Porn*, Baltar, 2018); "José Mojica Marins versus Coffin Joe: auteurism and stardom in Brazilian cinema" (in *Stars and Stardom in Brazilian Cinema*, Bergfelder; Shaw; Vieira, 2017); "Panorama histórico del horror en el cine brasileño (in *Horrofílmico - Aproximaciones al cine de terror en Latinoamérica y el Caribe*, Diaz-Zambrana; Tome, 2012).

Leslie S. Klinger (USA) is the editor of the highly-acclaimed New Annotated Dracula, New Annotated Frankenstein, and the two-volume New Annotated H. P. Lovecraft as well as the anthologies In the Shadow of Dracula and In the Shadow of Edgar Allen Poe, featuring 19th- century supernatural fiction. Together with Lisa Morton, he's also edited the anthologies Ghost Stories Weird Women, Weird Women II, and Haunted Tales, all with extensive selections of Victorian horror. He co-edited (with Eric Guignard) the HWA's Haunted Library of Horror Classics. His latest book, out October 15 from Mysterious Press, is New Annotated Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde.

Marius-Mircea Crișan (Romania) (dr Habil, PhD 2008 Univer-sity of Turin, Italy) is Associate Professor at the Teacher Training Dept., West University of Timisoara. He is the edi-tor of Dracula: An International Perspective (Palgrave Macmil-lan, Springer Nature 2017), coordinator of the special issue of Biblioteca Nova Bulletin "Speculative Fiction and the Frontiers of the Possible" (2019), author of The Birth of the Dracula Myth: Bram Stoker's Transylvania (2013) and The Impact of a Myth: Dracula and the Fictional Representation of the Romanian Space (2013), and co-editor of the volume Beliefs and Behaviours in Education and Culture: Cultural Determinants and Education (2017). Her monograph titled The Truths of Monsters: Coming of Age with Fantastic Media (McFarland, 2021) focuses on the use of monsters as literary tools addressing life challenges in coming-of-age fantasy and science fiction. She has published numerous articles and book chapters on the monstrous and is editor of Displacing the Anxieties of Our World: Spaces of the Imagination (Cambridge Scholars Publishing, 2017) and a Hungarian anthology of essays in Monster Studies (Athenaeum, 2021).

James McCrea (USA) is a semiotician and art historian with a strong thematic interest in iconographies of death and undeath, as well as materialities of the human corpse. Currently, he is in the final year of doctoral studies in Manchester Metropolitan University's Gothic Studies department researching a cultural history of the animated skeleton. In contrast to restricting himself to studying a single era in time, he enjoys following the certain trends in visual and material culture over the course of history to determine how they engage with the socio-cultural masses that produced them throughout. His independent research often pertains to funerary art, video-game design, and monster theory.

Jared L. Schmidt (USA) holds a PhD in Folklore Studies from the University of Wisconsin - Madison. He currently teaches humanities and art courses at two rural, coastal community colleges in Oregon, USA. He is also a co-founder and contributor to the social media brand, Folkwise. Since 2020, Schmidt has taught multiple undergraduate courses about vampires. His vampiric research heavily focuses on the legacy of Bela "Dracula" Lugosi, with multiple upcoming publications about the actor in popular culture, as well as a forthcoming work on vampires in Norwegian cinema and television.

Kyria Van Gasse (Belgium) has only just started her academic career, having just started her second year of the Art History course at the University of Ghent. She has always been interested in anything related to vampires, ever since she was quite young. Thus, it was very easy for her to decide that Vampire LARP will be a subject she'll write about. She is trying to find time to finally edit her first (vampire) novel and start her second one, and switches hobbies almost every few weeks, be it knitting, TikTok videos or random longform Youtube videos.

Magdalena Grabias (Poland) is an Assistant Professor and a Deputy Head of the Institute of Cultural Studies at Maria Curie-Skłodowska University in Lublin, Poland. She received her PhD in Cultural Studies in 2012. She specialises in Film Studies, Gothic Studies, Dracula Studies, literary translation and music journalism. She was the co-organiser of the Fourth World Dracula Congress in Dublin (2016) as well as numerous conferences in Poland. She is a co-founder of the international organisation "Children of the Night" and a co-organiser of International Dracula Congress series. Her academic publications include books: *Songs of Innocence and Experience: Romance in the Cinema of Frank Capra* (UK, 2013), *Visual Culture: Art, Popular Culture and Digital Media* (ed.) (Poland, 2020), as well as numerous articles in English, Polish and Romanian propagating film, music and theatre viewed from the perspective of philosophy, semiotics, anthropology and popular culture. Over the last decade, her

academic interest has been focused on Dracula and Vampire Studies, which resulted in a series of articles discussing the subject of literary and cinematic vampires and their meaning in contemporary culture. In 2019 she received the prestigious "International Helion Award" from the science fiction cultural association "Helion" in Timișoara, Romania.

Mike Shepherd (Scotland) is a local historian living in Cruden Bay, and is a founder member of the Port Erroll Heritage Group. When he started researching Bram Stoker's visits to his home village six years ago, he discovered a topic untouched by academics. His findings are in his book "When Brave Men Shudder", and are updated in "Slains Castle's Secret History", co-written with Dacre Stoker. Something unusual about Mike: the property deeds to his house in Cruden Bay are signed by a real-life character in one of Bram Stoker's novels - namely, the 20th Earl of Erroll, resident of Slains Castle.

Nancy Rosenberg England (USA) earned a PhD in English Literature from The University of Texas at Arlington. Her dissertation was "Establishing a Dracula Film Genre: Key Texts, Antecedents, and Offspring." She earned an M.A. in Humanities from Marymount University, Arlington, Virginia. Her thesis was "The Early Female Gothic Novel and Charlotte Dacre's Zofloya." She presently teaches Composition and Rhetoric at The University of Texas at Arlington. She is the author of "Untangling Late Victorian Anxieties: Hair Symbolism in Dracula" in the Journal of Dracula Studies.

Nina Trzaska (Poland) works as an academic teacher at University of Adam Mickiewicz in Poznań and at University of Warsaw. In her Master's thesis, she focused on Greek vampire folklore and currently she is conducting further research on this topic for her PhD thesis. She spoke about Greek vampires on many different conferences such as 'A Cross-Platform Dracula Conference' (Braşov 2018 & virtual event 2021), 'A' Διεθνές Συμπόσιο Νέων Ερευνητών Νεοελληνικών Σπουδών' (Granada, 2022) and 'Upiory, duchy, zjawy. Widmowe reprezentacje w popkulturze' (Katowice 2015). She also published two scientific articles about vampires – 'Protowampiry antycznej Grecji' ('Protovampires of Ancient Greece') in journal 'Nowy Filomata' (XIX, pp.80-93) and 'Elementy greckiego folkloru w europejskiej literaturze wampirycznej' ('Elements of Greek folklore in European vampire literature') in monography 'NaoKoło Migracji' (Poznań 2018, pp.79-91). She translated a few Greek pieces such as: novel 'Murdress' by Alexandros Papadiamantis, short story 'Frappe' by Petros Markaris and poems by Kyriakos Charalambidis.

Patricia Hradec (Brasil) holds a PhD in Letters from Universidade Presbiteriana Mackenzie (UPM). She conducts research in the field of Gothic literature and fantastic universes, more specifically with literary vampires. She has been a member of ABRALIC - Brazilian Association of Comparative Literature since 2019 and she is a member of the Gothic Studies Group at the State University of Rio de Janeiro (UERJ). She worked as a teacher in Letters and Pedagogy courses at several renowned colleges, but currently works with basic education in the areas of Portuguese and English in private schools.

Peadar O'Dea (Ireland) is an Irish disability activist, born with a visual impairment, he has over seven years of experience with disability organisations in the Republic of Ireland and the UK. He obtained an MA in Disability Studies from the University of Leeds; he is a lifelong Dracula fan.

Penelope Goodman (UK) is an academic Classicist at the University of Leeds. She is also a member of the London Dracula Society, and presented a paper on Dracula and Classical Antiquity at the 2018 Dracula Congress in Braşov. She regularly publishes academic work on receptions of Classics, such as on the films of Ray Harryhausen or concerning the emperor Augustus. Peter Gölz (Canada) is an Associate Professor in the Department of Germanic and Slavic Studies at the University of Victoria in British Columbia. Peter studied in Germany, England, and Canada, where he

completed his MA at the University of Waterloo and his PhD at Queen's University. He has published on computer-assisted language learning, Cyberpunk, German literature and film, and vampires. Peter continues to offer his course "A Short History of Vampires in Literature and Film" which normally attracts about 300 students. There will be a special event to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the course this fall.

Ruxandra Ivăncescu (Romania) is an Associate Professor at Transilvania University of Brașov, Romania. She graduated from the Faculty of Letters, Babeș-Bolyai University of Cluj, Romanian-English section. She has a PhD in Literature from the same university. She works at the Department of Literature and Cultural Studies of the Faculty of Letters in Brașov where she teaches Literature, Folklore, Cultural Anthropology and Creative Writing for the Master class students. At the Creative Writing course she teaches Literary Prose, especially Fantasy and Historical Literature. She published studies in Romanian Literature (O nouă viziune asupra literaturii române contemporane–A New Vision on the Romanian Contemporary Literature, 1999), cultural anthropology (Paradisul povestirii – The Paradise of The Tale, 2004) and also novels such as Maranon or the Real History of the Discovery of the New World, published in 2008, Ochiul dragonului – The Eye of the Dragon (2012, 2017) and Cavalerii doamnei in negru, The Lady in Black and her Knights (2017), a prequel to her earlier novel The Eye of the Dragon. As History was always her hobby, she writes historical novels, adding a mythical touch to her plot and her characters. The Eye of the Dragon develops its action around the family of Vlad Dracula. Her interest in History also triggered her studies of the mythology of Dracula, Bram Stoker's novel, and of the unfolding of vampire stories till the present, in both Film and Literature.

Roberto Cavalcante Rodrigues (Brasil) is an art historian, graphic designer and digital artist. Owns a bachelor degree in Graphic Design by Universidade Paulista (2014) and in Art History by Universidade Federal de São Paulo (2022). Currently researching in Art History's field at Universidade Federal de São Paulo, preparing his Master thesis about post mortem sexuality in vampiric cinema and working as an Art Director in the Municipal Secretariat of Human Rights and Citizenship of São Paulo. Regular member in the International Committee of Marketing and Public Relation and International Committee for Museums and Collections of Costume, ICOM Brazil.

Zsolt Bojti (Hungary) is lecturer at the Department of English Studies, Eötvös Loránd University (ELTE), and external lecturer at the Institute of English Studies, Károli Gáspár University of the Reformed Church in Hungary. He obtained a PhD degree in modern English and American literature and culture from ELTE. His doctoral dissertation, Wilde, Stenbock, Prime-Stenvenson: Homophilia and Hungarophilia in Fin-de-Siécle Literature (2022), deals with the connection between the beginning of German sexology and the English literary history of sexuality. As research fellow in the New National Excellence Programme (2019/2020), he published the first Hungarian translation and critical edition of Imre: A Memorandum by Edward Prime-Stevenson. Alexander Williams (UK) fiction writer, winner of Gold Stake Award 2020.

Presented work: Poverty, Parasites and Psychic Vampires. Gold Stake-winning author on his bestselling novel "Eternal Youth".

Alexander Williams grew up in rural Norfolk where he spent his childhood exploring old farmhouses and abandoned churches. He remembers nothing of his time in boarding school as he spent all his time in the library with his nose in a book. He was homeless between the age of seventeen and twenty-five and kept busy during the day by volunteering in an Oxfam bookstore, by night he worked on his first novel "Eternal Youth" sitting in a twenty-four MacDonalds with a notebook and pen. He is now a grown man who shares a small cottage with a black and white cat named Woobie and stays up every night writing by candlelight. He is diagnosed with Aspergers Syndrome. "Eternal Youth" won the Gold Stake Award for best vampire novel at the International Vampire Film and Arts Festival in 2020.

Chloe Hammond (Wales) fiction writer, the winner of the Gold Stake Award 2022.

Presented work: "The Caretakers" (a short story) and extract from "Darkly Dreaming" (a novel).

Chloe Hammond is an Aquarius, and she's very Aquarius. Born in Liverpool in 1975, she grew up in rural West Wales. She now lives in Barry, South Wales, with her husband and rescue cat and dogs. She studied Creative Writing as part of her degree always planned to write, but life got in the way. Chloe worked in homeless hostels, particularly with vulnerable teenagers for twenty years, and saw too many of the world's uninvited monsters. She developed extreme anxiety and depression, which caused terrifying nightmares and sleepless nights. In her typically contrary way, she used this to her advantage and the nightmares became this novel, and the sleepless nights were when she found time to write it. She created her own monsters to deal with the memories.

Her best friend, and number one cheer leader, was her inspiration and the person she could spin other worlds with. When her friend died suddenly of a brain haemorrhage, Chloe struggled to overcome her grief to start writing again. She had just found her rhythm again, when the worldwide pandemic hit, and she was gripped in the terror of losing more loved ones. She dug deep, and is currently working on the third book of the "Darkly Vampire Trilog"y, as Rae and Layla are booting her brain, demanding their story is written, they have adventures to live.

Chloe has had several poems and short stories published in various charity anthologies. She was nominated for both Best Paranormal Author and Best Horror Author in Reality Bites 2018 Book Awards. Chloe won a Gold Stake award at the International Vampire Film and Arts Festival 2022, for her short story, "The Caretakers".
